FIRST NATIONAL BANK OPENED ITS DOORS FOR BUSINESS IN 1888

Banking Institution Has Flourished Past 73 Years.

The First National Bank was granted Charter 3839 by the Comptroller of Currency at Wash. ington, D.C., and opened its doors for business Feb. 11, 1888, on the 1961: east side of the square, in one of the buildings now occupied by Stahl Hardware, with a capital of \$50,000.00. The records show Davi

first day. The officers of the new institution were John Lincoln, President; Vanhise, Vice-President, David and C. W. Lincoln, Cashier. The board of directors was formed by David Vanhise, John Lipp, Jr., J. W. Mayer, John Lincoln, C. K Lucas, John Buckles, and W. M. Barrett.

In the petition for the bank's charter, the names of 30 stockholders were executed, including Charles W. Lincoln, John Lincoln, William M. Martin, John Seyfer, David Vanhise, John Mayer, Herman Lushbaugh, John England Russell Scroggin, David Clark, Tomlinson, Jacob Bau-William Uhle, Andrew Alfred Buckles, Caleb Lucas, John Lipp Elias Buckles, Lorenzo Downing, William Schafer, John Ayres, I. Richner, John Kiick, Frank lin Foley, John Gillett, Ebenezer Buckingham and Milton Hoy.

In 1896 Wm. Rupp, Jr., and George Rupp bought the stock of John Lincoln and C. W. Lincoln and the management was changed. John Lincoln resigned as President and C. W. Lincoln as Cashier. David Vanhise was elected President; A. H. Lucas, Vice-President; Wm. Rupp, Jr., Cashier, and, George Rupp as assistant Cashier. The first dividend was paid in 1893.

In 1899, Wm. Rupp, Jr., resigned as Cashier and Robert Aitchison was elected as Cashier. In 1905 the bank moved to the new building erected by E. A. Danner on the south side of the square. In 1908, Robert Aitchison was elected President to fill the vacancy caused by the death of David Vanhise. C. K. Lucas was Vice-President; George Rupp as Cashier, and R. D. Aitchison as Assistant Cashier. In 1909, the old bank building on the east side was sold to the Masonie




